## Author as Character and Narrator: Deconstructing Personal Narratives from the r/AmlTheAsshole Reddit Community

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- A forum where users can anonymously share their personal experiences
- Events they have been blamed for or believe they should be blamed for
- Readers (the Commenters) vote on who is the asshole and leave comments explaining their reasoning

A catharsis for the frustrated moral philosopher in all of us, and a place to finally find out if you were wrong in an argument that's been bothering you. Tell us about any non-violent conflict you have experienced; give us both sides of the story, and find out if you're right, or you're the asshole. ## Operationalizing Author Representations

# Author as *Character* (Content & Information about Author)

- Demographics (age and gender)
- Power (Sap et al. 2017)
- Agency (Sap et al. 2017)
- Emotional story arc (Antoniak et al. 2019)
- Chain of events (Tambwekar et al. 2019)

# Author as *Narrator* (Style & Word Usage)

- Pronoun usage
- Dominant tone (VAD)
- Concreteness (Paetzold and Specia 2016)
- Familiarity (Paetzold and Specia 2016)
- IIWC
- Unigrams

### Data

- Data collected via the Pushshift Reddit API
- June 2013 to June 2021
- Cleaning:
  - Bots and moderators were removed
  - Use submissions with at least 500 words and 20 comments.
  - Remove judgements such as "No assholes here", "Everybody Sucks Here", etc.
- Final data set consists 38,060 submissions
  - 29,111 Not The Asshole (NTA; 76.5%)
  - 8,949 Yes The Asshole (YTA; 23.5%)



### Methods


- Extract *author-as-character* and *author-as-narrator* features
- Correlate each feature (logistic regression) with binary NTA/YTA labels
- Correct for multiple comparisons (false discovery correction)
- Report Cohen's D, which measures the difference between two group means





#### Assholes are


- Older
- Male
- Talk about people who are younger, female
- Lack agency & power (passive)






### Author as Character: Emotional Arc

# So what makes an asshole? (On average)

#### What makes an asshole *character*?

- Poster is older and male
- Other characters are younger and more female
- Poster lacks agency and power (events happen to them)

#### What makes an asshole *narrator*?

- Emotional and opinionated stories
- More abstract language
- Focus on relationships with women (instead of family or stressful events)

## Takeaways

- New framework for looking at personal narratives by separating "content" from "style"
  - With plenty of room to grow and add new features!
- There's many ways to be an asshole, but some are more common than others.
